I. INTRODUCTION

Immaculate Conception Academy (ICA) is a private, non-sectarian, co-educational institution of learning owned and managed by its stockholders. It is governed by policies promulgated by the Board of Directors. Since its establishment in 1947, Immaculate Conception Academy, which is situated in the City of Dasmariñas, continues its vocation in molding the youth into total individuals with desirable knowledge, competitive skills, and Christian values. In partnership with the parents, Barangay Council, Teachers Association and its stakeholders, this institution with competent and committed faculty and staff will deliver holistic quality basic education to the community and produce empowered employable graduates who are able to reach their full potential and are able to respond to the needs of the country and the world as a whole.

In our school, academic rigour and spirituality are valued at all stages, and the instruction focus is on challenge, engagement and achievement. Learning is celebrated in all its forms. A huge range of research and extension activities enhance the formal curriculum, and our students thrive within a vibrant programme. The school has a well-qualified and highly committed staff, both teaching and non-teaching. They, too, are valued as individuals and their continuous quest for advancement is well-supported.

A. BRIEF HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

IMMACULATE CONCEPTION ACADEMY, Inc., Dasmariñas, City Cavite was first organized in 1947. It opened its first classes in June 1948 to sixty seven (67) first and second year high school students. The first classroom was in the church convent, which at that time was the biggest building in town. Later, the school acquired a lot in the town plaza beside the church and built its two-storey building thereon in 1956. In 1979 a two-hectare lot in Ibayo was acquired and a one-storey building was made for the Industrial Arts and Physical Education classes. The site was called the Vocational Site.

A one-storey building was also built in a rented lot belonging to the church in the town plaza, which was used for the offices of the School Principal, Treasurer, canteen and one classroom. This building was eventually demolished. To make for the lost space three floors were added to the building



in the town plaza. Later, the Vocational Site in Ibayo was sold and a 2,212 sq.m. lot was acquired along E. Aguinaldo highway where a two-storey building was constructed. Another floor was added as the need arose. In June 1992, a preschool patterned after the Montessori System was opened In a rented place along Congressional Avenue across the Dela Salle Health Sciences complex.

At present there are FIVE (5) campuses, namely: The West campus (Ibayo), the South campus (Langkaan), the North campus (Salitran), the Science/Plaza campus (Dasmariñas Town Proper), and the ICA-MAIN (East Campus, Congressional Road). The five (5) campuses were established to bring the school closer to the residential areas and eventually serve as community centers for learning. It is envisioned that in the future the out-of-school youth may be helped with athletic facilities and libraries. Some form of adult education program can also be initiated. Each campus is equipped to handle kinder, elementary and junior and senior high school students.

II. REGISTRATION AND ADMISSION

A. NEW STUDENTS

KINDER REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Age Requirements:
 - a. Nursery: must be 4 years old by September of the Academic year
 - b. Kindergarten: must be 5 years old by September of the Academic year
- 2. Original copies of the following:
 - a. Must present Progress Report Card (SF9)
 - b. PSA Birth Certificate
 - c. Alien Certificate of Registration (ACR), for foreigners only
- 3. Must accomplish the Letter of Undertaking



ELEMENTARY LEVEL:

1. Grade 1

- Must be six (6) years old by September of the Academic year
- Must be a Kinder completer with Learner Reference Number (LRN)
- Must present Progress Report Card (SF9) and Certificate of Good Moral Character authenticated by authorities of school last attended
- Must submit PSA Birth Certificate (original)
- Must accomplish the Letter of Undertaking

2. Grade 2 - 6

- Must present Progress Report Card with LRN (SF9) and Certificate of Good Moral Character authenticated by authorities of school last attended
- Must submit PSA Birth Certificate (original)
- Must accomplish the Letter of Undertaking

JUNIOR AND SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL LEVEL:

1. Standard Program

- Must present Progress Report Card (SF9) and Certificate of Good Moral Character authenticated by authorities of school last attended
- Must submit PSA Birth Certificate (Photostat and original)
- Must accomplish the Letter of Undertaking
- Must have NO failure in any subject
- Honor students must present Certificate of Ranking for discount computation (incoming Grade 7 and Grade 11 only)

2. Science High School

- Must present Progress Report Card (SF9) with 90% and above General Weighted Average and no final grade lower than 85% in English, Mathematics and Science.
- Must submit Certificate of Good Moral Character authenticated by authorities of school last attended
- Must submit PSA Birth Certificate (original)
- Must accomplish the Letter of Undertaking
- Honor Students must present certificate of ranking for discount computation (incoming Grade 7 only)
- Transferees for grades 9 and 10 are not accepted



3. For incoming Senior High School

- Must present Progress Report Card (SF9) and Certificate of Good Moral Character authenticated by authorities of school last attended.
- Must submit the Certificate of Grade 10 Completion (Photostat)
- Must submit PSA (original)
- Must submit NCAE result
- Must accomplish the Letter of Undertaking

*Grades 1 to 12 applicants must accomplish the Agreement for Continuous Admission (as endorsed by the Guidance Office)

*for STEM strand, Math and Science final grade must at least be 80%

B. OLD STUDENTS

- Must present the Progress Report Card (SF9) upon enrollment
- Kinder to Grade 12 applicants must accomplish the Letter of Undertaking

C. SCHOLARSHIP / DISCOUNTS

Standard Program (Elementary, Junior High School and Senior High School) & Science High School

- 1. The per campus pupil/student in the grade level with the highest final general average in a class of 10-49 will be given a 100% discount on tuition fee. In a class of 50 and above, the per campus pupil/student in the grade level with the second to the highest final general average will be given 75% discount on tuition fee. In case of tie, the students with the highest final general average will be deemed first and second; and the discounts will be divided between/among them. In case the tie is on the second highest final average, the 75% discount will be divided among/between the students who garnered the same final average. For Senior High School, the ranking will based on the per campus overall grade level GWA regardless of the strand.
- 2. Entering Grade 7 students with the highest and 2nd to the highest final average from a class of 50 or more are entitled to a 100% and 75% discount on tuition fee respectively.



3. The younger of two (2) siblings from the same parents is entitled to a 10% discount on tuition fee.

*Not applicable for GASTPE recipients and Senior High School students

4. The youngest of three (3) siblings from the same parents is entitled to a 50% discount on tuition fee.

*Not applicable for GASTPE recipients and Senior High School students

5. The youngest of four (4) siblings from the same parents is entitled to a full discount on tuition fee.

*Not applicable for GASTPE recipients and Senior High School students
*Original (for verification only) and photocopy of marriage contract of parents and
PSA birth certificates of siblings being applied for scholarship should be presented
upon enrollment.

6. The first two currently enrolled children of ICA Alumni are entitled to a 20% discount on tuition fee.

*Not applicable for GASTPE recipients and Senior High School students

7. For Senior High School, only academic discount, Dr. PCCC, employee discount, and government voucher are applicable.

DR. PAULO C. CAMPOS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP QUALIFICATIONS:

- 1. All graduating pupils from public schools of Dasmariñas City, Cavite are eligible to apply for **Dr. Paulo C. Campos Memorial Scholarship** if they:
 - a. are with honors, with high honors, or with highest honors awardee;
 - are of good moral character as certified by their School Principal or Guidance Counselor
 - c. are a Filipino Citizen
 - d. pass all the subjects in the qualifying exams



- 2. To maintain the scholarship, the scholar:
 - a. must have NO grade lower than 85% and should maintain a General Weighted Average of 90%
 - b. must not be involved in any minor and/or major offense in the school

PRIVILEGES:

- 1. Student with the highest final average
 *100% Scholar on tuition and miscellaneous fees
- 2. Student with the second to the highest final average *90% Scholar on tuition and miscellaneous fees *subject to government subsidy
- 3. ENTRANCE EXAM QUALIFIERS:
 - 3.1 Basis: General weighted Average 60% Qualifying Exam 40%
 - 3.2 Applicant must take the qualifying examination and pass the interview by the scholarship committee.

90% and above - *Free tuition and miscellaneous fees 88% - 89% - *90% free tuition and miscellaneous fees 85% - 87% - *80% free tuition and miscellaneous fees *subject to government subsidy

ICA GASTPE Grantee

(Government Assistance to Students and Teachers in Private Education)

FINANCIAL GRANTS TO INCOMING GRADE 7 STUDENTS FROM PUBLIC SCHOOL.

The GASTPE grantees will pay only the parent's share from the total amount of GASTPE student fees for the curriculum year less the amount of the government subsidy. No maintaining grade is required provided that they will pass all the subjects. The grantees will enjoy the scholarship until they complete junior high school.



D. PAYMENT OF FEES

- 1. Tuition and other school fees may be paid in cash. Other modes of payment include monthly, quarterly, and semi-annual.
- 2. Full payment for the whole year is given 10% discount on tuition fee. All other modes of payment are required 30% down payment.
- 3. Pupils or students who drop out of school after October shall pay the tuition, miscellaneous and other school fees in full.
- 4. Pupils or students who dropped out of school before the month of October shall only pay the tuition, miscellaneous and other school fees up to the month they officially drop.

E. REFUND

Refundable amount shall be determined as follows:

- 1. 80% of the amount paid if the student withdraws before or within the first week from the opening of classes.
- 2. 50% of the amount paid if the student withdraws within the second and third week from the opening of classes.
- 3. No refund shall be given to a student who withdraws beyond the third week from the opening of classes.

Nursery - 4 years old by September

Kinder - 5 years old by September

B. ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION

1. ASSESSMENT/PERFORMANCE TASK

Assessments/performance tasks are given to help both the teacher and the student to evaluate what the latter has learned and what he/she still needs to know about a particular subject during a particular period of time. They could also very well serve as opportunities to build up one's character especially with regards to honesty and integrity. **HONESTY** must be exercised so that the examination will serve as a valid tool for evaluation.

The following rules shall govern all assessments/ performance task:

- a. The students must secure **assessment** permit (proof of payment) on or before the Quarterly Performance Assessment week.
- b. No special performance assessment will be given without the required assessment permit.
- Special performance assessment is given two weeks after the regular Quarterly Performance Assessment week provided valid reason is presented.

*No face to face quarterly examination will be given for the duration of online classes. Traditional onsite examination shall resume upon availability of COVID vaccine subject to IATF and DOH recommendation.

2. GRADING SYSTEM

The school follows the averaging grading system that is computed up to the second decimal place except when there is a tie between or among honor students. In such case, grades are computed up to the third decimal places. The lowest passing mark in any subject is a grade of 75%.

A final grade of 75 or higher in all learning areas allows the students to be promoted to the next grade level. At the end of the four quarters, the Final Grade for each learning area shall be reported as the average of the four quarterly ratings, expressed in the terms of the levels of proficiency. The general average shall be the average of the final grades of the different learning areas.

b.3. Science High School

Students in the Science High School should maintain a General Weighted Average of exactly 90% and above or as prescribed by the Department of Education. All Students 3rd Quarter G.W.A will be assessed by teachers and principal for them to monitor the progress of all students. IV. RULES ON ATTENDANCE

A. RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. A student who has incurred 20% absence of the total number of school days for the school year will be given a final failing grade in the subject(s).
 - 1.1 To control the absence rate each teacher will call the roll at the start of class.
 - 1.2 Upon incurring three (3) unexcused absences the student is issued an online warning by the class adviser in the presence of one of the parents or guardians.
 - 1.3 No absence is excusable except in cases where the student is a participant/representative in an activity officially recognized by the school;
 - 1.4 If a student incurs more than the allowable absences due to illness, a special consideration may be given if the student has been consistently performing above average. The President gives such consideration after consultation with the subject teachers concerned.
 - 1.5 Official dropping or transferring out may be allowed up to December only. In such case, the card and other credentials may be released upon securing clearance from all departments concerned.
- 2. A student is held responsible for all online assignments, lessons, and other requirements missed regardless of the reason for the absence.
- 3. For students representing the school in official contests, refer to Reg. Memorandum No. 13 S. 2015.



B. CONDUCT AND BEHAVIOR

Admission to the school is granted with a definite understanding that students and parents/guardians agree to comply with the school's rules and regulations covering students' conduct and behavior inside the classroom and within the campus.

The school authorities reserve the right to give warning, place on probation, suspend, or dismiss any student for improper conduct after due investigation and upon approval by the Board of Directors.

<u>Persons in Authority</u> – Pursuant to the recognition given by the DepEd to the school, officials from the School Director to the Principal and faculty members from department heads to classroom teachers as well as non-academic staff are all considered persons in authority during school hours inside the classroom or within the campus. Non-academic staffs are obliged to report offenses committed in their presence to the authority/authorities concerned for appropriate disciplinary action.

- e. Committing any action which would cast aspersion against the good name of the school, the ICANIAN community or the school administrators whether it is done inside or outside the campus.
- f. Preventing or threatening students or faculty members or authorities from discharging their duties.
- g. Unauthorized collection of fund or money
- h. Excessive absenteeism / excessive tardiness / excessive online cutting classes.



- i. Posting, uploading, distribution, spreading or otherwise dissemination of subversive materials that tend to undermine the ICA as an institution, its officers, teachers and staff, or undermine the Republic of the Philippines and any of its institutions of Government.
- j. Spreading of false news, rumors, or innuendos that are unsupported by facts or blatantly false that tend to dishonor, undermine ICA, its officers and staff, teachers and instructors, fellow ICA students or their parents and guardians.
- k. Bullying / Cyber bullying / Demolition of the reputation of a fellow student, teacher, staff or the school itself through social media and similar means / Bullying or threatening, harassing, intimidating a fellow student/s, a class officer, school authority, or the institution to prevent him/her from performing his/her duties or responsibilities. (Based on DepEd Order No. 40 s. 2012, DepEd Order No. 45 s. 2013, and Republic Act 10627)
- Viewing, distributing through electronic or wireless means, or sharing the item for viewing of any pornographic materials, violent videos, games or offensive materials.
- m. Committing acts of dishonesty
- n. Fraternization between students and teachers which involve meetings or hanging out outside of the school without the knowledge or consent of the parents or if these outside meetings are not sanctioned by the school as an activity.
- Appearing in online classrooms under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.
- p. Organizing, recruiting, hazing and bringing gangs or "barkadas" for the purpose of harassment of any student or school personnel. The school does not sanction membership or affiliation in any fraternity or unrecognized organization.



- q. Immorality (embracing, kissing, necking, sexting, posting lewd photos)
 - * Other acts against the Catholic ideals such as premarital pregnancy and abortion by students will be investigated by the Committee on Discipline and submits a report to the Principal. The Principal will recommend to the school director the action to be taken using the Republic Act No. 8972 (Solo Parents Welfare Act of 2000) and the Republic Act No. 9710 (Magna Carta of Women) as references.
- r. Students caught or proven to have engaged in acts of lasciviousness, immoral sexual activities, involving same sex individuals or different sexes, shall suffer the penalty of expulsion on the first offense provided due process is accorded to the parties, and the parents/guardians have been duly notified in writing.
- s. Actions against Data Privacy Act of 2012 (R.A.10173) and/or unauthorized access of another's information/data via portal or any social media account.
- *Any other major offense which is similar or analogous to the above mentioned offenses as determined by the School's Discipline Committee Guidelines and Policies.

- 4. As the school encourages independence among students, parents are allowed to give assistance to their children before and after online classes only.

5. AUTOMATIC CANCELLATION OF CLASSES DURING TYPHOONS

- Pre-school and Kindergarten classes are cancelled if PAGASA issues Storm Signal No. 1
- If Storm Signal No. 2 is raised, all pre-school, kindergarten elementary and Secondary classes in the affected area are automatically suspended.
- All classes from pre-school to secondary are suspended if PAGASA issues Storm Signal No. 3.

^{*}Online classes will push through under intermittent weather conditions. Suspension will be on a case to case basis.
